A Message from Mother Anne



Dear Friends,

We have been St. Paul's Beyond the Walls since the sudden impact of the Covid-19 pandemic in March. It has been a long eight months. The change is felt daily by each of us. You have been forced to find new ways of working, studying, and connecting. Together, we are living our faith and our hope in a

very new way. Through all of this, the clergy, staff and people of St. Paul's have continued to do the good and holy work of our Church.

• We help our community—we continue to host regular Red Cross blood drives, we help move families from homelessness to stable housing (including helping people evacuated during the recent fires), and we reach out through our music ministry.

• We gather virtually—our committees and ministries have shifted to online meetings. Our live-streamed services and concerts are reaching from 300 to 650 screens—a very large congregation compared to our usual Sunday attendance of 200-300 people.

• We worship—we gathered at a Mass on the Grass service unlike any other! Thank you to those of you who came. Thank you to those of you who stood in the park to watch and listen at a distance. Thank you to those of you who watched online and put up with the technical difficulties.

• We give—when we put out the call for help to pay for the new communications equipment—cameras and more you answered with abundant generosity. Our At Home Gala raised \$45,000—wonderful! Thank you for your faithfulness and trust. Every contribution, large and small, is precious and appreciated. Every bit of the money is allocated with great care.

My heart is overflowing with gratitude for you. I miss you, and I know you are there. Thank you for your messages: online, by email, and through the mail. You have told us how much everything we are doing together means to you. You tell us over and over that it helps to know St. Paul's is here, and to know you can express your faith through worship and music in safety, even in this isolated time.

We are St. Paul's—we are here for you now, and we will be here and strong when this pandemic season is over. We have not stopped doing the work of Christ in the world. You are part of something that makes a difference, right here. Right now. Thank you for your continued support, we depend on it. We can't be St. Paul's without you. We are a community of faith, of prayer, and of generous care for each other. We live in hope of God's promise to us. In the words of St. Paul: *"the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us"* (Romans 8).

May the grace, mercy and peace of God be with you now and evermore,

Stewardship & Anxiety

"For I know the plans I have for you, plans for your prosperity, and not for evil, to give you a future, and hope." (Jeremiah 29:11)

We have been living for many months now amid multiple crises, with lots of uncertainty. Uncertainty creates anxiety. Anxiety is the emotion-driven thought process that takes over when we are confronted by the limits of our control over outcomes. In other words, anxiety shows up when we realize we are not God.

The antidote to anxiety is *faith*. Now: faith is not naïve credulity that everything will turn out the way we want. Faith recognizes the boundary between the things that are ours to manage and the things we cannot control. The intersection of capacity and powerlessness is where we meet God. What we cannot control must be offered to God.

It's normal to have anxiety about finances. And why not? In our culture and economy, money equals survival. Anxiety – hyperawareness of the limits of our control – relates to our sense of security, and our culture tells us repeatedly that security depends on wealth. So when we are insecure, we worry about money. But as the twentieth-century martyr, Dietrich Bonhoeffer observed in his book, *The Cost of Discipleship* (1937), trusting in material wealth actually increases our anxiety, because we begin to worry about losing it. We perpetually wonder: will I have enough? The antidote to financial anxiety is *generosity*. Anxiety around money shows up in the Church, too because it represents stability and signifies the health of something vitally important to us. But the Church is not a business where success and viability are measured primarily by financial projections and meeting targets. The success of a vibrant parish is calibrated by the way it cares for its people, brings a message of hope, instructs us in the faith, draws us into a relationship with Christ, helps us make sense of our world, and gives purpose and meaning. That's not quantifiable in dollars.

But of course, it takes money to do what churches are expected to do. And so, in the midst of a great deal of very real anxiety and uncertainty, we ask you to pray and renew, increase, or initiate your financial support for St. Paul's, because you believe in what we're doing. Because you believe that Jesus is Lord and that what we teach, preach, believe, and live at St. Paul's is of real, tangible, and intangible benefit to our members and neighbors. Because this family in Christ has helped and supported you, inspired you, and you want that joy and consolation for others, as well. Give in gratitude for all that God has done for you and as a sign of your faith and trust that God will continue to provide.

St. Joseph's Woodcutters

The Woodcutters are back doing what they do best, namely cutting, storing, and delivering chopped wood to individuals in need. This ministry is long-standing and meets every Tuesday. Meet Nicholas Ertsgaard!

From the very beginning of the pandemic, Nicholas Ertsgaard has been our go-to person for online worship. The first services were broadcast using nothing but his mobile phone. Gifted with a tremendous ability to multitask, he was troubleshooting, reviewing tutorials, and setting up the layout and blocking for the service--all at the same time in those first days! He did amazing work under pressure. Nick has taken on a huge responsibility, and he has been involved in every step of identifying and applying our new technology and software. His efforts have made it possible for us to meet and worship together when we need each other more than ever.

Nick serves as Associate Director of Music at St. Paul's. He grew up in Salem and joined St. Paul's Music Ministry six years ago. In addition to assisting Dr. Klemme with our Music Guild, he directs the children's bell choirs, selects and plays the music for Wednesday services, runs Zoom meetings for the children's choirs, directs the Canterbury ensemble, plays and records for the St. Paul ringers, sings in and assists Paul leading Trinity Choir, composes music for music groups and services at St Paul's, and now he is also our tech guru.

His ministry extends beyond his service to St. Paul's. He is the program director of Western Compass, an ecumenical organization (partially funded by the Episcopal Diocese of Oregon) which ministers to students at Western Oregon University. They have weekly fellowship over shared meals, periodic special programs and retreats, and spiritual and emotional support. That ministry has also had to adapt to an online model. When the world is not amid a pandemic, he also sings professionally as a Tenor soloist, and with professional choral groups in Portland including Cappella Romana, Resonance Ensemble, and the Ensemble of Oregon, all of which are currently on hiatus.

Nick grew up in Salem and graduated from South Salem High School in 2006. Nick currently has a bachelor's degree in Music, with an emphasis in vocal performance, from Millikin University in Decatur, IL, and a bachelor's degree in Science in communicative disorders from Utah State University. He is currently continuing his education and working towards his master's degree in Speech-Language Pathology at Nova Southeastern University. Nick and Hanna were married in July 2013 and they welcomed twin boys, James and Benjamin, in November 2017. Nick and Hanna were gracious to share those precious moments; they allowed Dr. Klemme and Mother Anne to meet the boys in the hospital, on the day they were born!

SENIOR WARDEN MESSAGE

St. Paul's Anti-Racism Statement: "As followers of Christ, we strive to be an inclusive and affirming congregation. Everyone is welcome to participate fully in our community life, regardless of race or ethnicity, national origin, citizenship, age, political views, education, physical ability, economic or employment situation, relationship status, gender expression, sexual orientation, or any other markers of identity people sometimes use to create division. All are invited to receive Holy Communion. As St. Paul wrote in the Letter to the Romans, "Nothing can separate us from the love of God"."

Dear Friends,

By now you are aware of the banners that are flying proudly on our church property: Made in the Image of God, Black Lives Matter. Your Vestry carefully considered expressing our mission and crafted the wording for the banner. We recognize making a civil rights statement could be seen as controversial, but many members of our congregation feel that a public statement regarding the current racial unrest in our community is an important proclamation of the Good News of Jesus Christ. Your Vestry agreed.

Last year, Vestry developed a statement of our Core Values, founded on the truth everyone is created equal in the image of God. From that, we clarified our commitment that St. Paul's is a strong, thriving, caring, inclusive and open faith community. The wording in our banners. and the Anti-Racism statement adopted by Vestry makes the point that we are not there yet.

We established that St. Paul's needs to strive for a more just community--a community that acknowledges that white privilege, and the resulting denial of true equal access to education, health care, housing, and jobs to nonwhite individuals, are not Gospel values. We are called to participate in the building of God's just and peaceful Kingdom.

We are in support of a non-partisan, social justice and civil rights movement. We believe that our banners give a voice to many in our community who are not being heard. It is perfectly expressed in our Baptismal Covenant that we will strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being. We affirm that all lives matter, but only when black lives matter equally will all lives truly matter.

This past Sunday, two members of our congregation led a Coffee Class conversation on the impact of racism, and specifically how the laws, policies, and practices that shaped Oregon's troubled racial past were engineered with the intention of oppressing non-white people. To some extent, the history of the Episcopal Church has been complicit; the Church's early leaders also engaged in these same practices, or remained silent. The Coffee Class discussion was informative, interactive, and overall very positive. We prayed for the power of the Holy Spirit to help us live into our Baptismal Covenant.

I invite you to join us for the next session, November 15, on this topic. Coffee class and Zoom information will be available in the weekly e-Board. Let's work together to ensure that St. Paul's future is shaped by our Gospel values.
